## **Nevada's Metro Areas See Slight Uptick in June Unemployment Rates**

CARSON CITY, NV —In June, the state's metro areas experienced slight increases in unemployment, but the rates are down over the year. Las Vegas rose to 6.9 percent, while Reno/Sparks increased slightly to 5.9 percent. Carson City saw a slight uptick to 6.9 percent.

“Despite the small increases in unemployment over the month, the Silver State saw record breaking increases in employment,” said Bill Anderson, chief economist for Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation. “All of the metro areas experienced strong job gains. Monthly volatility in the unemployment rate is not cause for concern. A better gauge of the labor market is based on year-over-year comparisons. Statewide and the metro areas continue to see falling unemployment rates on a year-over-year basis.”

Las Vegas' and Reno's employment grew faster than the state as a whole. Las Vegas saw the highest nominal growth adding 26,400 jobs over the year. Reno/Sparks added 8,100 jobs, he said.


## NEVADA SUB-STATE LABOR MARKET OVERVIEW June 2016

In June, Statewide employment estimates were record breaking, adding a seasonally adjusted 7,500, relative to May. The strong job numbers in the State over-the-month, lead to employment increases in all of the metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs). Las Vegas is up 3,300 jobs; the result of a 200 job increase in payrolls (not adjusted for seasonality), when a decrease of 3,100 jobs was expected. In Reno/Sparks, we expected payrolls to decrease by 900



jobs; however, jobs actually increased by 500, leading to a seasonally adjusted increase of 1,400 jobs. Finally, Carson City job numbers were expected to increase by 200 jobs, but actually realized an increase of 300 jobs. Consequently, there was a seasonally adjusted increase of 100 jobs this month in the State capital.



Year-over-year the State's largest population centers gained jobs. In fact, Las Vegas and Reno both grew at a faster rate than the State as a whole. Las Vegas was home to the highest nominal growth, 26,400 jobs, an increase of 2.9 percent, relative to June 2015. Specifically, goods-producing industries added 7,400 jobs and service



providers added 18,700<sup>1</sup>. In Reno/Sparks, service providers increased significantly, with a year-over-year increase of 6,900 jobs, and goods-producing employment added 1,100 jobs to payrolls. All told, growth in the Reno/Sparks area totaled 8,100 jobs, up 3.9 percent from June last year. Carson City was the only metro area to decline, down 200 jobs year-over-year. In the State as a whole, job numbers increased 2.7 percent year-over-year, adding a seasonally adjusted 34,400 jobs.


Prior to the recession, Nevada had an unusually high percentage of construction employment, totaling 133,800 out of 1,284,000 jobs (10.4 percent) as of 2007. While overall employment in the State has recovered the majority of jobs lost, as of 2015, construction has yet to recover the jobs lost over the downturn, down nearly five percentage points from the peak, at 5.6 percent of total employment (70,200 out of 1,245,000 jobs). Perhaps most importantly, Nevada's share of construction jobs was nearly twice



the national average in 2007 (10.4 percent vs 5.7 percent); however, in 2015, the share in the Silver State is much more aligned with the U.S. (5.6 percent vs 4.7 percent). This trend correlates with a more stable construction industry, and overall economy, for Nevada.

At the county level, Clark had a higher pre-recessionary ratio of construction employment than any of the other metro areas, at 11.1 percent. Additionally, the construction industry in Clark was affected more than the State as a whole, with construction job share

down 5.5 percentage points from 2007, to 5.6 percent in 2015. Over the economic downturn, the share of construction industry employment in Washoe decreased slightly less than in Clark, down from 9.4 percent in 2007, to 6.2 percent in 2015, or 3.2 percentage points. Construction employment in Carson City accounted for 6.6 percent of total employment during pre-recessionary highs. During 2015, construction employment in the Silver State's capital dropped three percentage points, to 3.6 percent.





es in all but two counties, unemployment rates remain below ten percent for all of the Silver State's counties, in June. Rates ranged from 5.2 percent in Esmeralda to 9.9 percent in Mineral. In addition to Esmeralda, relatively low unemployment rates are also found in White Pine and Elko, at 5.3 percent and 5.5 percent, respectively. The highest unemployment rates, other than Mineral, belong to Lyon (8.6 percent) and Nye (8.5 percent).

This month, the unemployment rates in the State's metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) increased on a month-over-month basis but decreased year-over-year<sup>2</sup>. The rate in Las Vegas is up 0.5 percentage point from May, at 6.9 percent, but is down 0.2 percentage points from last year. Over-the-year, the rate in the Reno/Sparks area decreased 0.5 percentage point, to 5.9 percent, but is up 0.4 percentage point over-the-month. Relative to last month, the Carson City is up 0.3 percentage point; however, over-the-year the rate declined 0.3 percentage point, for an unemployment rate of 6.9 percent.

Despite over-the-month increas-

<sup>2</sup> The State's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate is 6.4 percent in June, up from 6.1 percent in May and down from 6.8 percent in June 2015. Unemployment rates for the State's metropolitan areas and counties reported here are not adjusted for seasonality. Hence, comparisons to the State's seasonally adjusted rate should be avoided. Legitimate comparisons, however, can be made to the State's unadjusted rate - 6.8 percent in June, up from 6.2 percent in May and down from seven percent in June 2015.

<sup>3</sup> The Department of Employment, Training, and Rehabilitation is a client of Burning Glass Technologies. Among other things, Burning Glass has developed a number of tools to assist a variety of workforce development entities in efforts to match workers with jobs. Online job posting information is available via their Labor Insight tool.



period last year. Washoe also realized significant growth in postings, with an increase of 4,100 ads, totaling 20,700 postings. Pershing was the only county to hold steady year-over-year, with 141 postings year-to-date. Eureka and Lander realized over-the-year declines in job postings. Eureka declined more than any other county, with 16 less postings than last year.
