## **Nevada's Unemployment Rate Rises Slightly in July to 12 Percent**

Nevada's unemployment rate rose 0.4 of a percentage point, to a seasonally adjusted 12 percent in July, however it is still down year over year and two percentage points below the recessionary peak of 14 percent, said Bill Anderson, chief economist for the Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation (DETR). The 12 percent rate of joblessness equates to 163,700 people out of work in the state. While not directly comparable to the state's seasonally adjusted figure, the Las Vegas metro area has the highest unemployment rate amongst the state's three population centers, at 12.9 percent, not seasonally adjusted, in July. In Carson City, the July unemployment rate stood at 12.2 percent. The Reno-Sparks MSA tallied a 12 percent rate, Anderson said.

At the county-level, the state's rural regions continue to have the lowest jobless rates. Lander County, with a rate of 5.7 percent in July, leads the way. Esmeralda is next lowest, at 6.5 percent, followed by Elko County's 6.7 percent. The highest unemployment rates continue to be found in the "bedroom communities" of Nye (15.5 percent) and Lyon (15.3 percent) Counties.

Over the past 12 months, the Nevada economy has added 10,300 jobs, with 12,600 new positions in private establishments being partially offset by losses in the public sector. The leisure and hospitality sector continues to be the driving force behind Nevada's job growth, providing 5,100 new jobs over the year and 1,200 over the month.

"I am pleased that job growth continued for a 13th consecutive month, but against the backdrop of a weak national economy not all the news was good," Governor Brian Sandoval said. "As part of Nevada's slow recovery, our state experienced a slight uptick in unemployment in July, as occurred in the country as a whole. This news is further evidence that we must continue business development efforts to attract new companies and support the expansion of existing companies to get more Nevadans back to work."

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DETR is comprised of the Employment Security Division, Equal Rights Commission, Rehabilitation Division, the Information Development and Processing Division and the Research and Analysis Bureau. DETR works in partnership with the Nevada JobConnect System to provide training and job placement services to job seekers and to assist employers in hiring practices.

## NEVADA LABOR MARKET OVERVIEW July 2012

Barometers of Nevada labor market conditions in July sent mixed signals. Most importantly, job levels continued to expand at a modest pace. At the same time, the unemployment rate jumped 0.4 percentage point, to a seasonally adjusted 12 percent. The unemployment rate also rose nationwide, from 8.2 percent to 8.3 percent. It's hard to draw definitive conclusions from these conflicting trends, but we see little in these results to change our outlook for continued moderate improvement in the State's labor market looking forward. Some months will likely bring encouraging news, while other months will result in a retreat, but the overall trend is one of slow recovery.


While up from June readings, the

State's jobless rate is down noticeably from July 2011, when it came in at 13.8 percent. All told, there were 163,700 Nevadans counted amongst the unemployed this July (seasonally adjusted). The unemployment rate stands two percentage points below its recession peak of 14 percent. However, even after three years of economic recovery, it still exceeds the 5.2 percent jobless rate from December 2007, the official start of the downturn.

Long-term unemployment remains a problem, both in Nevada and throughout the U.S. One side-effect is that, for many, eligibility for unemployment insurance has been exhausted. As a result, just 22 percent of the unemployed are

receiving regular State unemployment insurance benefits. At the height of the recession, this "coverage ratio" exceeded 50 percent. Federally-funded benefit extensions have, to date, offset at least some of the impacts of the erosion in the coverage ratio.

As a side note, to be counted in the official estimate of the unemployed,

other jobless Nevadans who are available for work but have not satisfied the work search requirement, plus involuntary part-time workers, came in at 22.1 percent.


Given historical trends, we would have expected jobs in Nevada to decline by 8,700


those who are jobless must have actively sought work in the past four weeks. We are often asked for a so-called "real" rate of unemployment, which broadens the official definition. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics provides this information in the form of its Alternative Measures of Labor Underutilization (the U-1 through U-6 scale). For instance, one measure, U-3, is nearly identical in scope to the official unemployment rate. It stood at 12.3 percent in the four quarters ending in 2012:IIQ. The U-4 measure came in at 13.4 percent over the same period, and includes discouraged workers (the jobless who are available for work but have not looked for work in the past four months because they feel that no jobs are available for them). U-6, the broadest measure, incorporates all

over the June-July timeframe. This year, however, that decline was just 6,600. The end result is a seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment gain of 2,100 in July, with the gains again concentrated in the private sector. Government employment was little changed over the month. Over the past 12 months, the Nevada economy has added 10,300 jobs, with 12,600 new positions in private establishments being partially offset by losses in the public sector.

An analysis of Nevada's job growth relative to other States highlights some interesting trends. Prior to the recession, Nevada had the highest job growth rate in the nation over the 2003-2005 period. At the height of the recession, in 2009 and 2010,

Nevada had the most pronounced job loss in the nation. However, Nevada has made up ground as the modest recovery has unfolded. By mid-year 2012, in June (the most recent month available at this time), just 19 states had a higher job growth rate than Nevada's.





The leisure and hospitality sector continues to be the driving force behind Nevada's job growth, providing 5,100 new jobs over the year and 1,200 over the month. Other major industries posted large seasonally adjusted job gains in July relative to the prior month, including trade/transportation/utilities (1,100) and financial activities (800). These gains were partially offset by declines in construction (-1,300) and professional/business services (-500). Both the mining sector and educational and health services sector reached new record high employment levels in July sitting at 16,300 and 107,700 respectively.

A number of industries typically experience routine drops in employment from June to July, with the largest of these being the local government sector. Given historical patterns in local government, mainly tied to summer breaks in schools, payrolls tend to decrease by about 5,200 workers from June to July. This year the drop was larger than expected at 5,600, resulting in a seasonally adjusted loss of 400 local government jobs.


All told, through the first seven months of the year, private sector employment in Nevada is up by 13,700 compared to the January-July 2011 period. While this growth is well-below pre-recessionary trends, it represents marked improvement from the losses which occurred during the downturn.

On the first Friday of every month, the Bureau of Labor Statistics releases information on job gains/losses for the U.S. as a whole. As with most measures of labor market activity, there is considerable volatility from month-to-month. A good rule of thumb is that it takes sustained job growth of approximately 150 thousand per month to facilitate declines in the unemployment rate. Job gains during the current recovery have averaged about 153 thousand per month, nearly identical to the expansionary period in the mid-2000s (155 thousand per month).

While not directly comparable to the State's seasonally adjusted figure, the Las Vegas metro area is home to the highest unemployment rate amongst the State's three population centers, at 12.9 percent, not seasonally adjusted, in July.<sup>1</sup> Carson City is home to a 12.2

<sup>1</sup> Unemployment rates for the State's metropolitan areas and counties reported here are not adjusted for seasonality. Hence, comparisons to the State's seasonally adjusted rate should be avoided. Legitimate comparisons, however, can be made to the State's unadjusted rate – 12.5 percent in July, up from 11.9 percent in June and 14.1 percent in July 2011.

percent jobless rate. The Reno/Sparks MSA tallied a 12 percent rate. All three regions have witnessed year-over-year declines (-1.6 points in Las Vegas, -0.8 point in Carson City, and -1.3 points in Reno/Sparks). These year-over-year comparisons are consistent with Statewide trends (-1.6 percentage points, not seasonally adjusted).




At the county-level, the State’s rural regions continue to have the lowest jobless rates. Lander County, with a rate of 5.7 percent in July, leads the way. Esmeralda is next lowest, at 6.5 percent, followed by Elko County’s 6.7 percent. The highest unemployment rates continue to be found in the “bedroom communities” of Nye (15.5 percent) and Lyon (15.3 percent) Counties.

On the employment front, Las Vegas job levels are up 1,900, seasonally adjusted, from June, and 8,700 from a year ago. Carson City added a minimal 100 jobs over-the-month,

but job readings are still off from last year by 900. Reno actually lost 1,200 jobs over the month, and remains 1,400 below July 2011 levels.

The Reno/Sparks metropolitan area is still facing falling employment in the casino-hotel sector, unlike Las Vegas where major casinos have been hiring workers. To illustrate, the casino-hotel sector in Reno/Sparks shed 500 jobs, while Las Vegas added 2,300 jobs over-the-year (not seasonally adjusted). Southern Nevada has benefited from rebounding visitation. In the north, visitor volume has failed to show any upward momentum. Even though the major casinos in Reno/Sparks are not hiring, overall, the leisure and hospitality sector has grown by 1,100 jobs over-the-year. (The leisure and hospitality sector is composed of the arts, entertainment, and recreation sector and the accommodation and food services sector.) Most of the growth in the leisure and



hospitality sector in the Reno/Sparks area has been concentrated in the arts, entertainment and recreation industry, which includes casinos without hotels. Assuming casino venues without hotels cater to locals, growth in this sector points to a

rebound in the non-tourism gaming market in Reno/Sparks. Other growing sectors in the Reno/Sparks area include the educational and health services sector and transportation, warehousing, and utilities sector.
